## Graduation with Leadership Distinction (GLD) through the Research Pathway

GLD is a distinctive honor given to USC students by the University of South Carolina. Students are recognized at a cording ceremony on the Columbia campus. These students wear the cord during graduation and are verbally recognized as they walk the stage. This is a superior honor that looks amazing on resumes and applications.

To earn GLD in research students must:

- 1. Have minimum 3.0 GPA
- 2. Participate in research for 1-2 semesters
- 3. Participate in 2-3 enhancement experiences (such as a guest speaker)
- 4. Have 3-6 credit hours of the appropriate courses (listed on the webpage)
- 5. Present research
- 6. Create an E-Portfolio online
